
### **Terminology**

- CSE Commercial sexual exploitation
- CSEC Commercial sexual exploitation of children
- Trafficking Exploitation
- Providers Anyone who works in a child-serving capacity

### **Terminology**

- Boys Cisgender male youth or children
- Gender Nonconforming Youth Youth or child who does not conform to traditional gender roles
- Trans Youth Youth or child whose gender identity does not match their sex at birth

Myth: Commercial sexual exploitation of children primarily or exclusively affects cisgender girls.



#### **Existing Research - Prevalence of Trafficking**

- No accurate count of overall trafficking prevalence exists.
- Some studies suggest comparable numbers of exploited cisgender boys and girls.
- Trans youth are exploited at higher rates.



### **CSE-IT Data**

Data range: April 2015 - June 2023

281,680 screenings 196,678 youth screened



### What do the CSE-IT data show?

Data range: April 2015 - June 2023

**15.4%** of all youth who show clear signs of trafficking are **boys** 



### What do the CSE-IT data show?

Data range: April 2015 - June 2023

One out of six trans-identified youth screened on the CSE-IT show clear signs of trafficking.



Myth: Commercial sexual exploitation of children primarily or exclusively affects cisgender girls.

## What are the consequences?



 Exploited boys and trans youth are not identified by providers.

 Even if identified, there is a severe lack of services for exploited boys and trans youth.

 Male and trans survivors are not reflected in data.

#### **Study Methods**

- Focus groups and interviews
  - 34 survivors of exploitation and providers who work with exploited youth
  - Wide range of gender identities, locations, professions

**Key Finding #1:** The observable signs of trafficking do not differ by gender.



**Key Finding #2:** Signs of trafficking among boys and trans youth are often missed or ignored by providers.



**Key Finding #3:** Exploited boys and trans youth face cultural and systemic barriers to care.

### What can educators do?



#### What can educators do?

- 1. Acknowledge exploitation for all genders.
- 2. Provide training that incorporates all genders.
- 3. Provide education for youth and caregivers.
- 4. Implement CSEC screening.
- 5. Have clear protocols and next steps.
- 6. Know your resources.
- 7. Build relationships with cismale, trans, and gender nonconforming youth.



#### 1. Acknowledge exploitation for all genders.

#### Exploitation affects all genders!

- Call it out directly.
- Share knowledge with peers and leadership.



#### 2. Provide training that incorporates all genders.

#### Update CSEC training.

- Address myths of gender and exploitation.
- Presenter gender diversity in examples.



#### 3. Provide education for youth and caregivers.

- Create conversation.
- Incorporate a prevention curriculum.
  - Caregivers PTA meetings, workshops, etc.
  - Youth health class, online content, etc.




#### 4. Implement CSEC screening.

- Conduct CSEC screening tool.
  - Validated
  - Trauma informed
  - Track screening data



#### 5. Have clear protocols and next steps.



#### 6. Know your resources.

- Who is connected to the youth?
- Who are the experts in my school/district?
- What organizations do CSEC/gender affirming work?

#### 7. Build relationships with cis-male and trans youth.

- Create a foundation for trust.
  - Improve rapport.
  - Offer non-judgmental support.
  - Create safe and inclusive environments.
