Ms. Janelle Hughes serves as the Project Director for the Readiness and Emergency Management for Schools (REMS) Technical Assistance Center. Over her career, she has supported the work of multiple Federal agencies including more than six U.S. Department of Education centers, offices, and programs; the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and its Administration for Children and Families, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, and several institutes within the National Institutes of Health; the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development; U.S. Department of Homeland Security; and U.S. Department of Transportation.
